

### Context

- General reductions in funding / "more for less" dynamic across all sectors:
  - Ofsted-like quality regime for HE sector
- Root and Branch Curriculum Reform, phased over 4 years:
  - Progress and Attainment 8
  - GCSE, A Level and Level 3 Technical Qualification reforms
- A renewed focus on CEIAG in the Ofsted Framework, especially post-16.
   Strong steer towards gaining a Quality Careers Award and a new national careers policy imminent:
  - The rise of Apprenticeships and an increased focus on employer engagement and employability skills
- Ongoing inequality in access to HE for some communities / socioeconomic groups
- BREXIT: Implications for HE, the labour market and careers guidance
